LIARS CLUB AUCTION: RULES as of 2025

- On the day of the auction, absolutely NO SELLING of merchandise between members is permitted.
- All items are model related and should be things that someone might actually want to buy. No old spark plugs or welcome mats etc...
- 3. All items will start with a minimum bid. This would be a fair price, but not ridiculously cheap. The person donating the item can place a note with the suggested minimum bid, OR can be determined verbally, by the auctioneer before bidding starts.
- 4. If the minimum bid is not reached, the item will then be removed from auction and returned to the owner.

- 5. All winning bids must be paid in full immediately after winning. No IOU's or other BS. Anyone who wins a bid and does not pay, will forfeit the item which will be sent back to be auctioned off again.
- Additional rules may be implemented before the Auction starts pending a majority vote, or if the President says so.

I often have dreams of visiting a hobby shop in places I've never seen before. I always wonder if such places really exist. Well, I've found TWO such places, one of which is REAL and the other is NOT. Let me explain.....

In July, I visited family in California, and had the privilege to visit three major car museums. I can write an entire article about these places, but for

purposes of the article I'd like to focus on the hobby shop inside the LIONS foundation drag racing Museum, in Compton, LA. The LIONS Museum is a tribute and re-creation of the famous LIONS drag strip that was in the area and closed in the 70.s Many famous and historic race cars reside there.

They have re-created the starting line of the track which includes the actual guard rails, grand stands, timing tower and starting line Christmas tree. Cars are lined up and look ready to race. The beautifully painted murals on the surrounding walls add the finishing touch making this a very realistic and all-encompassing display. But it doesn't end there. The museum features an entire "main street" including a movie theatre with marquee, Barber shop, Arcade, Music store, and yes, an old-fashioned HOBBY SHOP!







The hobby shop is something out of a dream because upon seeing it, almost everyone (my age) can identify with how it is set up and the items on display. Now this is an "installment" so you cannot enter the store; rather it is designed as if you were walking along main street and happen to see it and look through the window. You can see old wooden shelving. Planes hanging from the ceiling. Model kits everywhere. Rare old kits especially the cars. There is a fully assembled model of the Monogram Big Tee 1/8 scale kit on the counter top. Theres a revolving wire rack with almost every Revell "parts Pack" in

the front window. Large 1/8 scale car kits at the top of the shelves. Theres a section for vintage aircraft kits; made by Aurora, Renwall, Monogram, Hawk.... the list goes on and on. (I wish I had the key to open the door! Lol)

Later, In August I attended the PGI: Pyrotechnics Guild International, yearly Convention. Yes, this is another hobby of mine and I'm sure it all started back in the day when model cars were blown up with firecrackers, and set on fire. In order to host an international Fireworks convention, it is usually held in remote parts of America, and this year it was in IOWA. To my surprise driving down main street in Ames Iowa, there before my eyes is something out of a dream. A store with a large sign "THE HOBBY SHOP" and yes, this one is REAL!

I spent a good amount of time just looking at the front window display before I walked in. Theres many planes suspended from the ceiling. The store appeared to have just about everything a hobbyist could want. It literally was a one stop destination. I met the owner; Mr. Mike Templeton and he told me the store was first opened in 1949 by Earl and Zita Noid. A new owner took over in 1979 then sold it to Mike in 2016 After he retired from the Union Pacific Railroad. Since then, he has expanded the selection of merchandise.

Mike is like a historian of the hobby. His passion is obvious, and he speaks from experience of being involved in all phases; ranging from Military planes and vehicles, slot cars, model cars of all years and makes.







Theres also model rocketry, and a nice selection of publications. He showed me actual advertising

artwork that is preserved in excellent condition. The AMT Friction car display was particularly interesting: Back in the day AMT supplied a cardboard stand that would hold all the current year Promo style, friction cars. He also had a Ford car color duplicator card.



Original vintage kits are proudly displayed behind the counter: which was really more like a combination work bench, showcase, and time machine. As we were talking, a train passed by and I saw it through the back window. It was very close to the store. Mike knew the specific information and train history which I found fascinating. It was easy for Mike to remember because he grew up with, and later worked with the Railroad until his retirement. I met another gentleman who was a frequent customer, and the conversation just got more interesting. This is a true Hobby Shop that is real, and I had a great time visiting there.

Mr. Templeton also buys and sells vintage toys, trains, and diecasts. You never know what you will find.



I was a young teenager in 1965 and had a paying after school job. I was a Newsday carrier delivering the daily afternoon paper to 50+ customers in my area. So, with earnings at about \$6 weekly, I could pretty much buy what I wanted without having to ask my parents for money.

And what I liked was Car Magazines, Comic Books, and Model Cars. AMT had the biggest variety of kits and all ranging in price from \$1 for the Craftsman Jr. line of kits, to \$1.49 for most of their lines of kits, with the priciest ones at most \$2.

I also enjoyed reading comic books, then costing a mere 12 cents each. And since comics also had plugs and storylines involving growing popular trends of the time, I found one line of comics that combined two of my best interests.



As an example, check out these 2 comic books featuring Archie and Friends, Americas perennial teenager. On one of the issues, he's building a model of what looks like the then-new Ford Mustang, with commentary from his 2 on and offagain girlfriends Betty and Veronica. On the other Archie issue, he's racing a slot car against Veronica's Father.

It's evident that model building and slot car racing was at it's peek in the mid-1960s. Most of the male students I knew at High School back in the day build model cars, and the luckiest ones had both models and slot car sets of their own.

Unfortunately, none of the original model kits and slot cars from my youth have survived to the current day, but I have spent a good portion of my older life and career wealth in getting back most everything I once had back in the day and then some. Overall, I think I'm winning!

This Hot Wheels Lending Library Is Proof That There's Hope for Humanity

You've heard "<u>leave a penny</u>, take a penny." The concept is not unique, but that doesn't necessarily make it less compelling, and it's the premise of

this toy car "lending library" in Nova Scotia, Canada. It was a father-son effort put together by <u>Dads Diecast Den</u>, which you can find <u>just about anywhere</u> on social media.

It's exactly what it sounds like: a small box on a pedestal in "Dad's" front yard, but rather than being filled with books, it's full of diecast cars. What's there to explain, really? Officially, the "Little Free Library" has existed since 2009, but a rudimentary version of this concept has been around far longer than that; the organization itself attributes the original idea to Andrew Carnegie. That means it officially took 15 years for somebody to come up with this wholesome crossover. It's about time.

And let's be honest: <u>Diecast</u> cars aren't <u>just for kids</u>. You'd certainly be hard-pressed to find a member of the automotive media that doesn't have at least one scale model car <u>on their desk somewhere</u>. Your author alone has a half-dozen on display at any given time.

As for the library itself? Well, if you don't live in the far eastern provinces of the Great White North, it's probably a bit out of reach. But if you'd like to foster automotive enthusiasm amongst your neighborhood kiddos, the 'Den offered the following advice to those who might be inclined to build one themselves:

To keep it safe from theft, vandalism, and general misuse, here are 10 practical and community minded tips:

1. Keep It Visible

Place the library in a well lit, high-traffic area where neighbors regularly pass by. Visibility discourages bad behavior.

2. Build It Sturdy

Use weatherproof and durable materials. Reinforce the structure so it can't be easily damaged or broken into.

- 3. Install a Camera or Dummy Camera
 Even a visible fake camera or "Smile, you're
 on camera" sign can deter theft and
 vandalism.
- 4. Get Kids Involved
 When local kids feel ownership, they help
 protect it. Let them help stock or decorate it,

they'll look out for it too.


- 5. Create a Steward or Rotation
 Assign a few community members to check
 on it weekly. A quick check in keeps things
 tidy and deters misuse.
- 6. Post Friendly RulesClear signage helps:
- "Take One, Leave One. Please Be Kind."
 Positive messaging often works better than threats.
- 7. Build Community Awareness
 Let neighbors know about it via local social media, flyers, or block chats. More people watching = more protection.
- 8. Coordinate with Local Patrols
 If you have community policing, let them know
 about the library. It's a good project they
 might help keep an eye on.
- 9. Make It Personal and Loved
 Paint it with bright, welcoming designs,
 maybe even have local kids paint it. Vandals
 are less likely to damage something clearly
 cared for.
- 10. Remove Rare/High-Value Cars Keep it stocked with fun, accessible

Anyone heard this one is coming out from Atlantis?



A Historic Rescue Effort After the 2018 bankruptcy of Hobbico and the sale of Revell's assets, many vintage molds faced destruction or indefinite storage. Recognizing the significance of

these molds (many dating back to the 50s and 60s), Atlantis's founders, Peter Vetri and Rick DelFavero, negotiated to acquire hundreds of molds stored in Revell's Elk Grove, Illinois facility. These included tooling from Revell, Monogram, Aurora, and Renwal, covering subjects from aircraft, ships, and cars to military vehicles, figures, and sci-fi themes. This acquisition was far from a straightforward transaction, however. The molds represented decades of history, meaning Atlantis faced some pretty big challenges, including tooling damage, loss, and aging from years of moving and neglect. They were committed to saving these molds from being scrapped for material value, though, eventually preserving a priceless legacy for our modeling community.

Restoring and Modifying the Original Molds Among the most challenging molds to restore were the original Aurora sets, famous for their monster figures and prehistoric scenes. Many Aurora molds were damaged due to a notable train derailment incident during their transfer to Monogram in the late 70s. Some mold halves were frozen in ice and mud, and many included beryllium copper inserts hardened to extreme levels, making them exceptionally difficult to repair or modify without risk of warping. Restoration required meticulous cleaning, damage assessment, mold base rebuilding, and preservation of original detail. Adding modern surface detail, such as raised panel lines, was often impractical due to the hardness of mold components, with acid etching used sparingly. Some kits benefited from reverse engineering or retooling when original molds were beyond salvage, such as prehistoric animal models.


for Modern Builders While keeping original shapes and details intact to satisfy collectors and purists, Atlantis also made thoughtful modifications to improve kit assembly and presentation, including:

- Introducing clear parts for windows and windscreens where none previously existed.
- Upgrading decals with accurate, vibrant images, including collectible cards reminiscent of original packaging.
- Maintaining snap-fit designs for easier building experiences, especially prominent in the Aurora monster series. Notable Reissues and Product Lines Atlantis's portfolio boasts a wide range of re-issued kits from three brands.
 Aurora: Classic monster figures like the Glow Mummy and Wolfman, prehistoric scenes including Saber Tooth Tiger and Cave Bear, and sci-fi kits. These releases retain the charm and approachable builds that made Aurora famous. Revell and Monogram: Iconic aircraft such as the B-24J Buffalo Bill, classic American cars like the Tri-Five Chevies, and various military vehicles and ships. These kits, often decades old, were refreshed with

modern decals and re introduced with vintagestyle box art.

No Reserve: Ferrari V12 Wooden Scale Model
This wooden scale model is based on the
Colombo V12 engine used in the Ferrari 365
GTB/4 Daytona and was fabricated by the seller
over a period of three years. The model is
constructed from several variations of wood
depicting the carburetors, intake trumpets, valve
covers, cylinder heads, engine block, distributors,
oil filter housings, and clutch assembly. This
wooden V12 scale model is now offered in San
Jose, California, with a walnut base.



The scale model was fabricated and assembled by the seller using multiple pieces of wood with varying finishes, cables, and wire joined together with stainless steel hardware to resemble the V12 engine used in the Ferrari 365 GTB/4 Daytona. The model is 1:1 in scale and measures approximately 37" long by 24" wide and 26" tall with an estimated weight of fifty-five pounds. Details include an engine block, cylinder heads, a generator, and a water pump.



The model is topped with six sculpted carburetors along with velocity stacks and throttle linkages. The valve covers are constructed with walnut and feature polished brass trim and Ferrari-style branding.




Dual oil filter housings are mounted at the front of the model, while twin distributors and a scalloped wood block in the shape of a clutch pressure plate are secured at the rear. Decorative fasteners and clamps wear a contrasting finish and are shown up close in the gallery.



The piece is situated atop a walnut base with a hand-rubbed oil finish.



A Certificate of Authenticity will accompany the model.



























